Bridge Over Troubled Waters started as a Mobile Medical Street Outreach Program in 1970 and evolved from there, basing program development on input from youth on the street and the assessment of their needs.









By bringing services directly to youth on their own turf, Streetwork has helped to ensure that Bridge programs remain flexible and viable in responding to the ever-changing needs of vulnerable young people.

Why is Street Outreach essential?



- Runaways and homeless youth are isolated and hidden from view
- Many, if not most, have had difficult or negative experiences with service providers and adults who should have cared for them
- Street youth are vulnerable and generally will not seek services or assistance away from the streets
- Good Streetwork builds trust and can be the most important source of referrals to in-house services

The Role and Benefit of the Mobile Medical Van



- We're here right now.
- Headache, injury, infection? We can take care of that!
- Worried about HIV/AIDS, Hep-C?
 We can help.
- Need a warm cup of cocoa? A sandwich? We've got that!
- Afraid of the hospital? Our doctor is non-threatening and respectful.

How do you know where the youth are?



- You know the City, its culture and geography.
- You learn from the kids themselves.
- You walk the streets.
- Visit the shelters.
- Collaborate and connect with other providers.
- Know the police around the streets.
- You're out there every day.

- Don't be judgmental
- Get to know youth
- Engage with a "respectful curiosity"
- Be there when they're there
- Respect them

Characteristics of a Great Street Outreach Worker!



- Acceptance and tolerance
- Reliable and unpretentious
- Comfortable on the streets
- Peer-like, but professional
- Not easily intimidated
- Adaptable and aware
- Perceptive and intuitive
- Independent and collaborative
- Only some of this is about training; the rest is innate

- If you can't make referrals in-house to your own agency, you've got to make referrals to others.

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


