


Landscape of RHY in Vermont

Why Workforce Development?

I) Education & Employment Focused services






Youth earn money while learning skills

2) Employer Focused services








Mission balances sustainability/profit with programming

Examples: The Empowerment Plan, Find Edmonton, Mittscoots





Program individualized for youth - create unique workforce development plan




Youth & Mentor connected to local entrepreneur to help



Training is provided / business plan developed / Connected to local ventures




Match can compete for seed funding



How you can implement entrepreneurship in your program

- Step I ASK YOUTH: Identify youth with an interest / readiness for entrepreneurship
- Step 2 ASK COMMUNITY: Connect with local entrepreneurs to serve as mentors
- Step 3 MAKE CONNECTIONS: Have your Small Business Development center provide you with training
- Step 4 Connect with SCORE for additional mentoring / develop a business plan
- Step 5 Connect with local banks and businesses to provide seed money (Start small)
