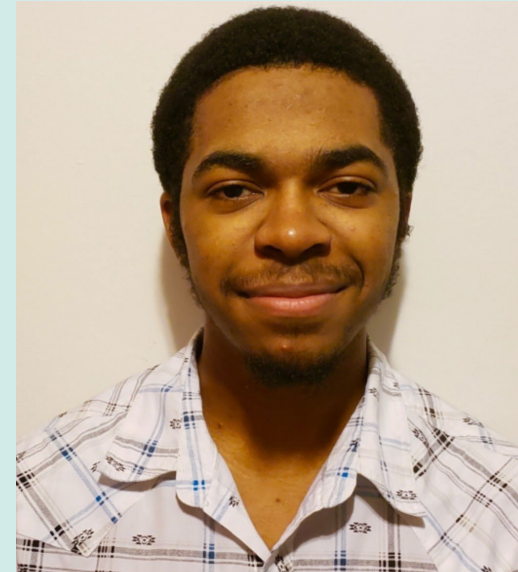

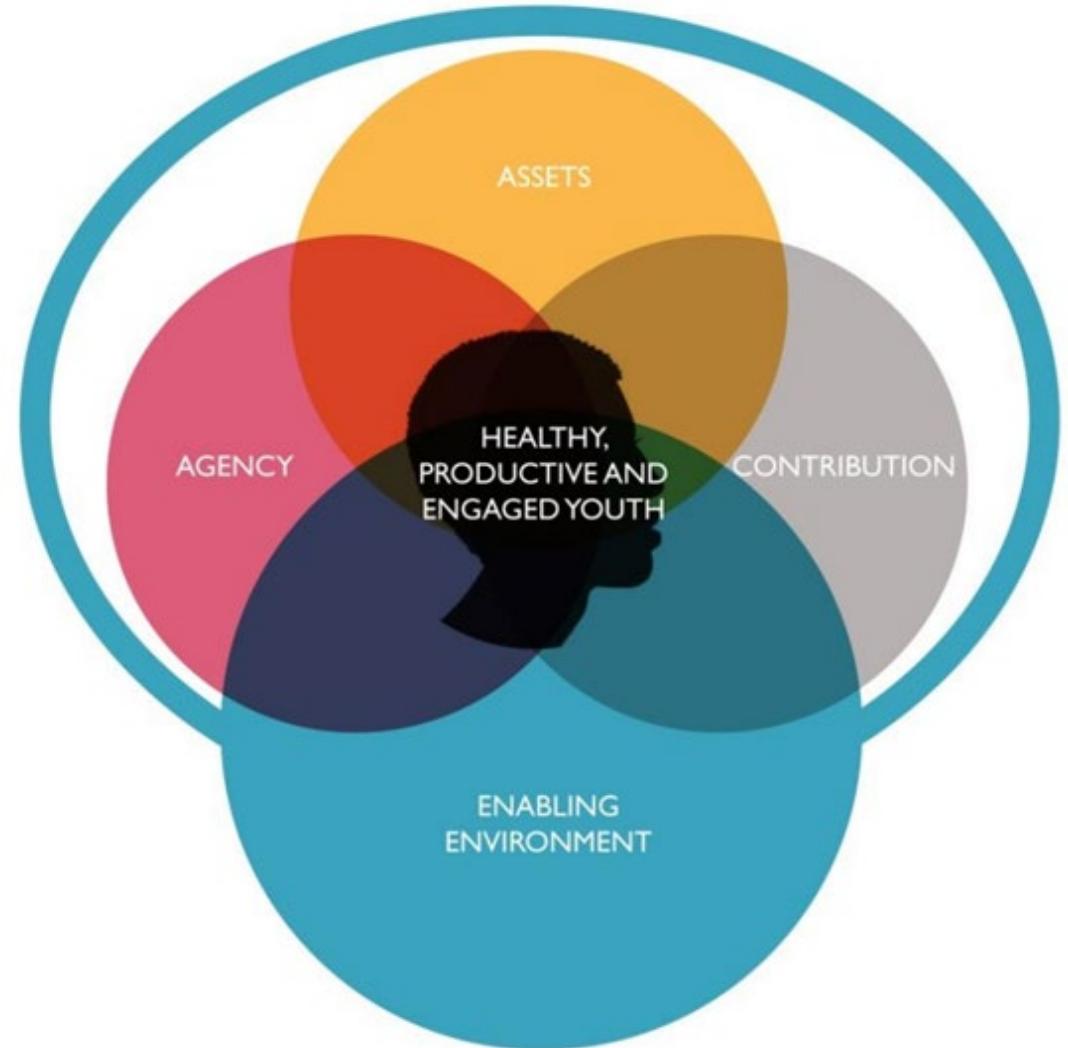
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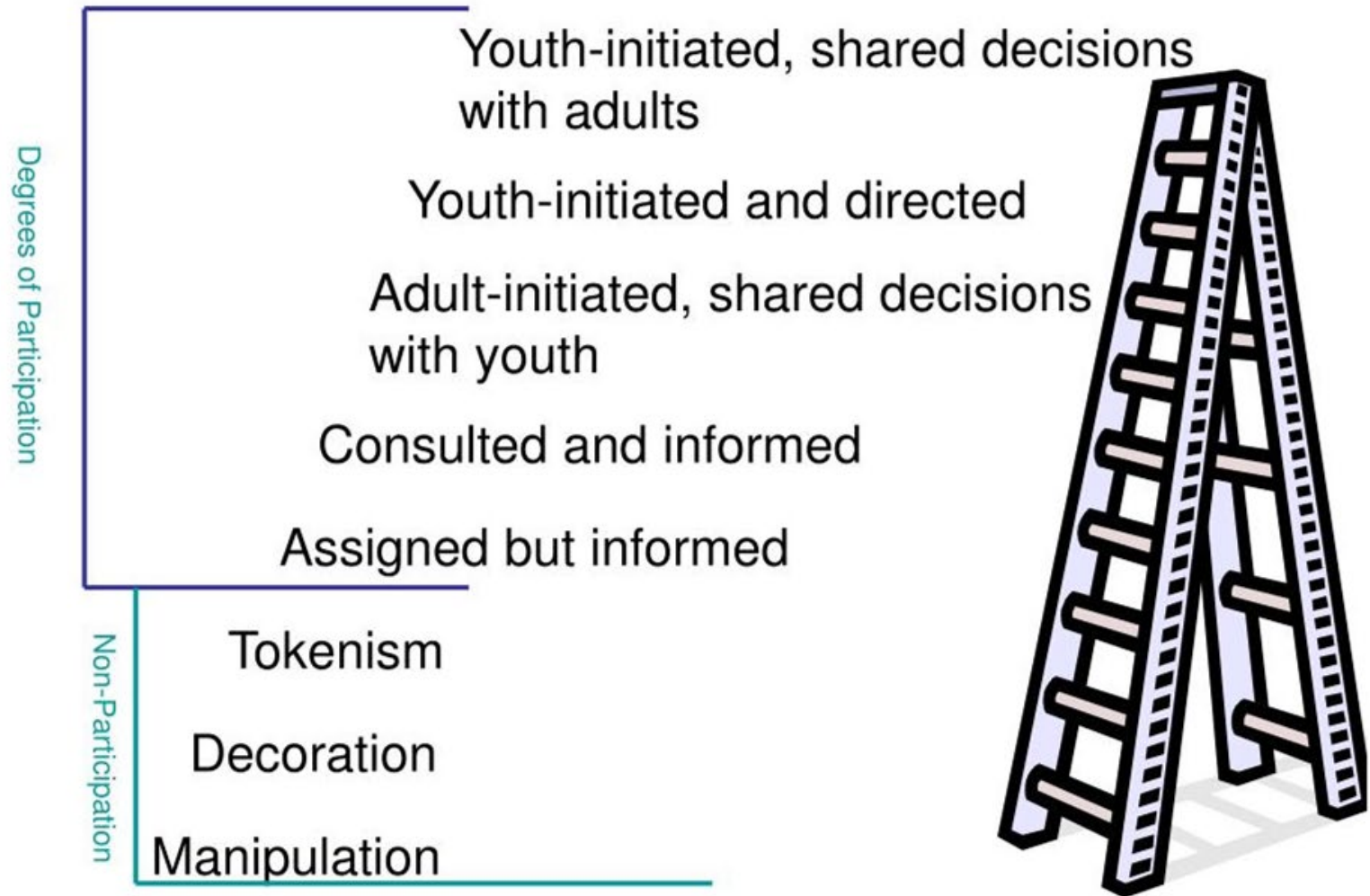

For the Young Person

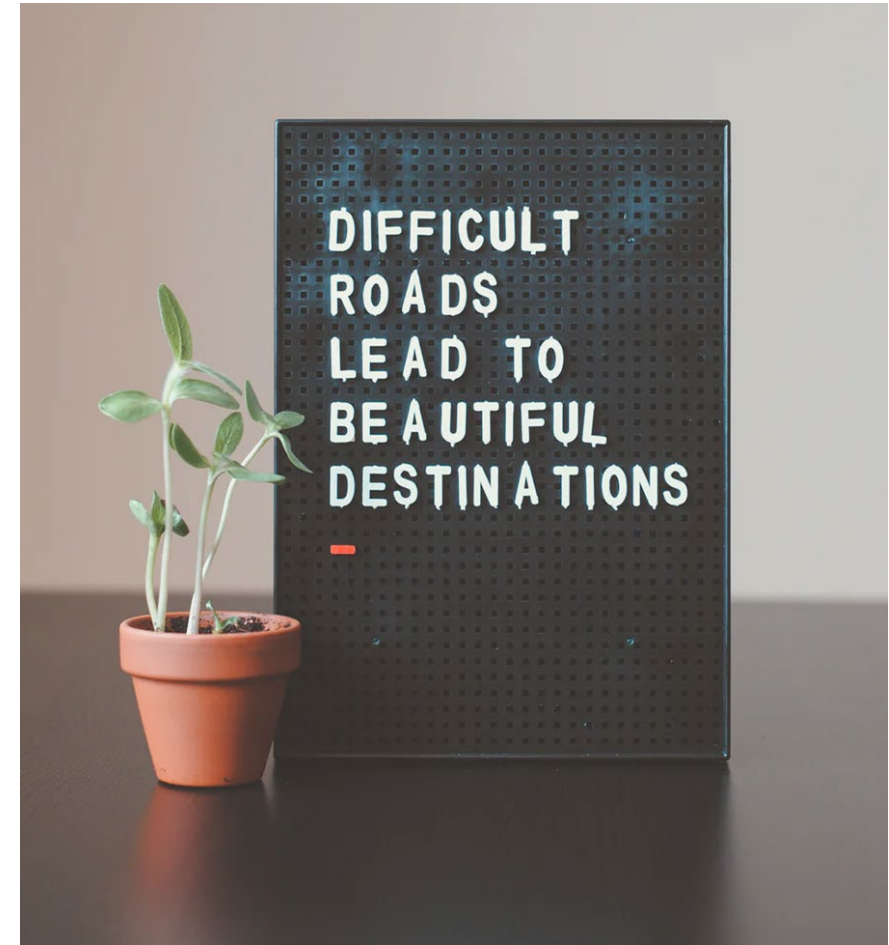
- Sense of power and self-determination

- Self-advocacy & self-sufficiency skills

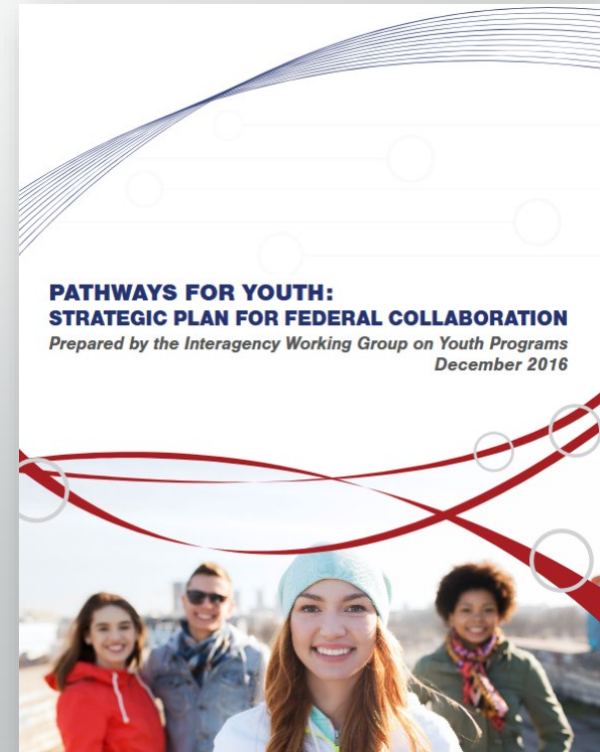

- Executive Order 13459 signed by President Bush in 2008 - Improving the Coordination and Effectiveness of Youth Programs
 - Support enhanced collaboration to improve outcomes for youth
 - Identify and disseminate evidence-based strategies that support youth
 - Create a federal interagency website on youth ages 10-24
- More than 20 federal departments and agencies are partners

Strategic Plan

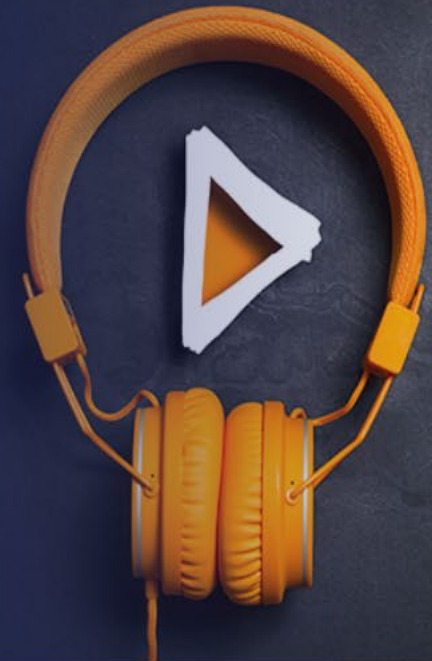
- Congress directed the Working Group to create an overarching strategic plan for federal youth policy in 2009
- Listening sessions held across the country
- *Pathways for Youth* finalized in 2016
 - Views young people as resources, not problems
 - Promotes positive outcomes for all youth

Map My Community

USASpending.gov provides information on more than 10,000 federally-funded programs from more than 100 federal agencies' financial systems. youth.gov has developed this tool to help you find who has received federal funding for programs that serve youth and their families in your community. People across the country have used this to find organizations that share their mission and might want to collaborate and/or to identify gaps in programs and services.

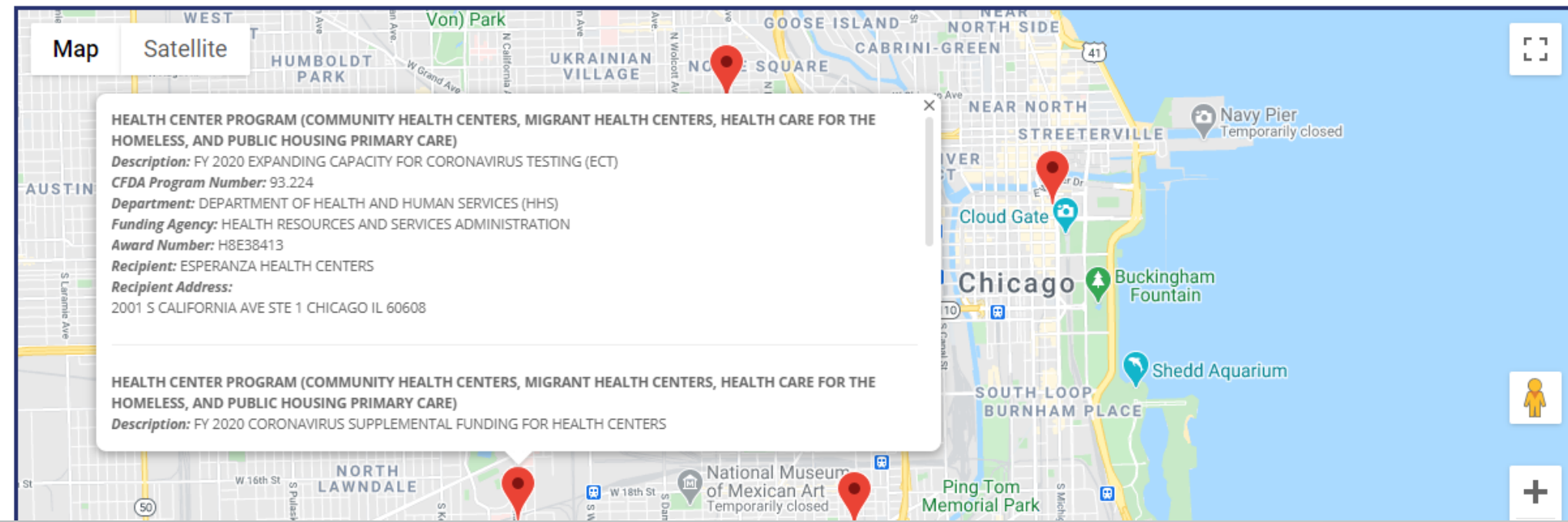
Search for federally-funded programs using the filters below.

- Enter a **keyword** (optional) to narrow your search to a specific topic, or leave it blank to find all programs in your area.
- Enter a U.S. **address or ZIP code** (required) to identify programs in a certain geographic region. Use the **miles** (optional; default = 5 miles) dropdown menu to broaden or narrow your search.
- Click on **"Show Filters"** (optional) for advanced search options, including search for programs by youth.gov's youth **topics** and the federal Interagency Working Group on Youth Programs' **departments**.

Your search results will appear as location pins on the map and in a table below the map. Click on a pin to learn more about the program(s) at that location.

Positive Youth Development

Definition:

PYD is an intentional, prosocial approach that engages youth within their communities, schools, organizations, peer groups, and families in a manner that is productive and constructive; recognizes, utilizes, and enhances young people's strengths; and promotes positive outcomes for young people by providing opportunities, fostering positive relationships, and furnishing the support needed to build on their leadership strengths.

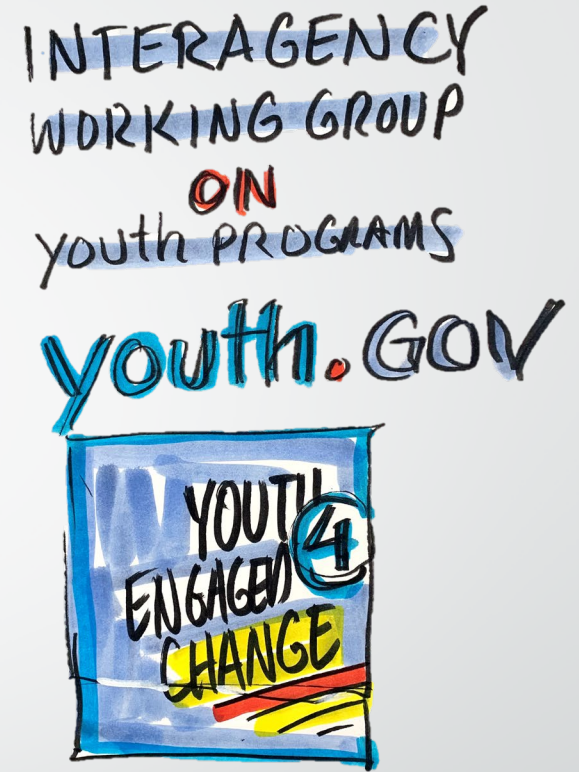

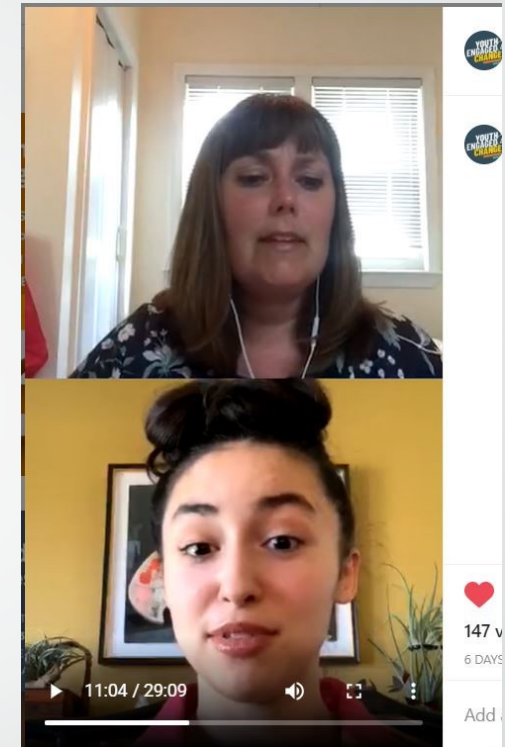

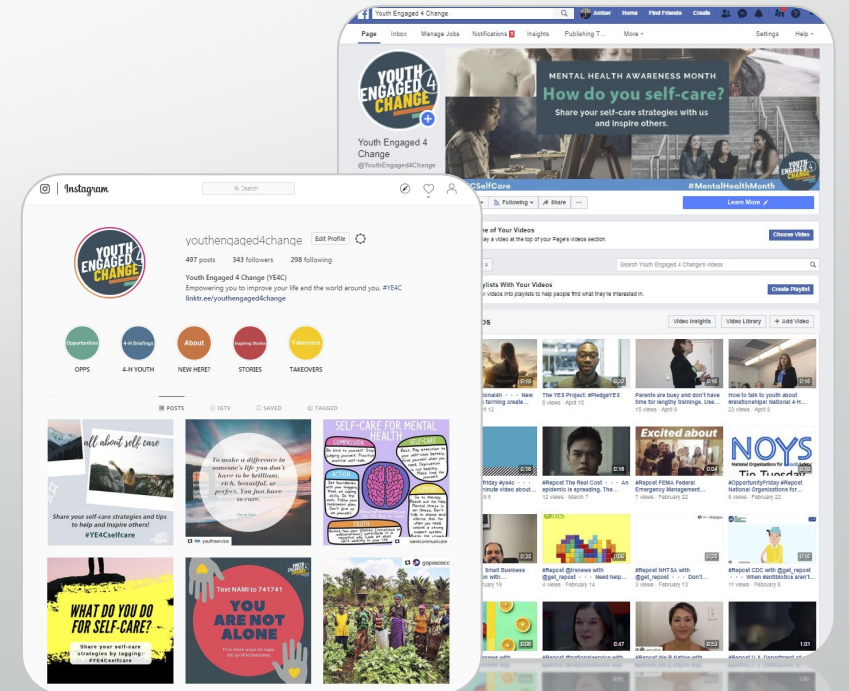

Considerations for Authentic & Equitable Engagement with Young People

- Intergenerational power sharing
- Avoid tokenism and exploitation
- Equitable compensation and career pathways
- Create spaces for youth to feel physically and psychologically safe
- Eliminate adultism
- Build and maintain trust
- Respect youth/young adults for their ideas and expertise
- Set young people up for success



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Key Questions

- How will you outreach and engage young people in leadership roles?
- How will you ensure that leadership opportunities are empowering and non-exploitive?
- How will you ensure that young people are prepared to fully “show up” as a leader in their role?
- How will you compensate young people for the time and labor?
- How will you support young people’s personal and professional development?
- How will you gather and incorporate young people’s feedback to improve the leadership role(s)?
